What To Do If You See a Feral Hog

- Take caution! – Do not approach. These animals can be tusked and dangerous.
- If you possible, safely contain the hog in a fenced in area.
- Use fences and other barriers to protect sensitive areas from feral hogs.
- Notify your installation's natural resources manager, hunting permit coordinator, or the military police.

Keep America Free of Feral Hogs

Feral hogs were introduced to the U.S. in the 16th century and have since eroded the quality of innumerable ecosystems. By foraging and grubbing, feral hogs make it easier for non-native weeds to invade, which in turn damages natural ecosystems. Feral hogs dig up soil along runways, exposing insects that attract large birds, thereby creating a bird airstrike hazard risk for pilots.

Feral Hogs are characterized by:

- Powerful body with thick neck and large snout.
- Males have two tusks measuring about 4 inches long.
- Dark gray to brown bristly hair.
- 3 ft tall and weighs 150-200 lbs.
